Supply list Acrylic Painting Class:

1-16x20 Canvas or Canvas Board

- Acrylic tube paints: Cadmium yellow, lemon yellow, cadmium red, phthalo blue or ultramarine blue, sap green, cadmium orange, violet, mars or ivory black, and titanium white. Try to buy artist quality paints if you can: Liquitex or Golden. If you are on a budget, you may purchase student grade or semiprofessional paints which are Van Gogh and Daler Rowney brands. These paints have less pigment and more binder (filler). They are fine to work with for learning though.
- Brushes: Synthetic brushes
- 2 - flat brushes, size 10 and 12 or a $1^{\prime \prime}$ and $1 / 2^{\prime \prime}$
- 2 -round brushes, size 4 and 6
- 2 - filbert brushes, sizes 8 and 10
-OR you can buy a set of brushes. Just make sure there are a variety of sizes and shapes within it.
-a 4 or 8 ounce jar of matte or gloss medium - if you want a matte finish, pick the matte medium. If you like it shiny, pick the gloss medium.
-a water container. (can be a plastic cup.)
-rags to wipe paint on. Helpful to have, not required: -masking tape. -palette knife to mix paint. (can be plastic.)
- palette - there are many different kinds of palettes. You may buy the disposable palettes or the plastic ones. Some have lids to keep the paint from drying out in between painting sessions. These are usually expensive. If you palette does not have a lid, cling wrap can be used or Rubbermaid and Tupperware make rectangular containers with lids that can work as well. If budget is a concern, Styrofoam paper plates work.
-Easel - The Art Shoppe has a wonderful travel easel for $\$ 9.99$ that works perfectly.
- paper towels - Bounty or Viva work really well.
- small spray bottle for water
